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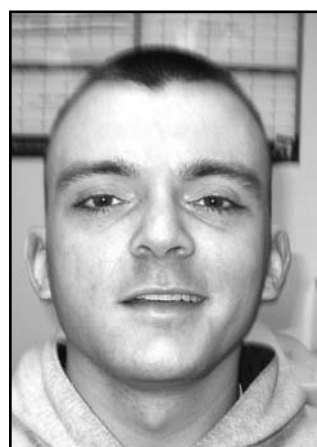

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The importance of scholarships was talked about.

William Perry's "Theory of Intellectual and Ethical Development" was presented in three stages as people develop their reasoning maturity.

The first stage, dualism, is when things are perceived as good or bad.

Multiplicity, the second stage, demonstrates that knowledge is just an option. Sometimes students rebel against a teacher's judgement.

According to the last stage, relativism, it's OK to have different opinions but professors are usually going to have more experience in their field.

In the third example, Staten mentioned someone she knew, whose religious beliefs were challenged in a philosophy class she took.

Staten said it upset her so much she almost dropped the class. She decided to keep the class and although her beliefs remained the same, she now has respect for other views

Staten also used the book "Learning from Green Eggs and Ham" by Dr. Seuss as an example.

According to the book, there are some things in life that might be good for you, but we resist change. The book also states that it often makes us a more whole person if we do experience some change.

Staten urged students to connect with a faculty member for help in their college experience.

"Find out how you fit into the world around you," Staten said.
